## An Appropriate Response to Grace Matthew 8:1-4

- I.Last week: The leper is us.
  - A. The leper was physically disfigured, socially isolated.
    - 1. He was spiritually unclean.
    - 2. He was an outcast, rejected, despised.
  - B. When you heard that you are the leper, were you offended?
    - 1. There are two ways you could take that.
      - (a) You could view it through the lens of religion.
      - (b) You could view it through the lens of the Gospel.
    - 2. If you were offended:
      - (a) Was it because you saw yourself as being a good person?
      - (b) Or maybe you thought, "I'm a sinner, but I'm not that bad."
      - (c) That is looking through the religious lens.
      - (d) You think you were somewhat acceptable based on your own morality.
    - 3. If you were viewing this through the lens of the Gospel:
      - (a) You wouldn't feel offended, you would feel grateful.
      - (b) The passage would emphasize to you how lost you were.
      - (c) It would emphasize how much you needed to be rescued.
      - (d) It would emphasize how good God has been to you.
    - 4. Your heart would be moved by the goodness of God.
      - (a) You would feel gratitude well up.
      - (b) You would worship God for his goodness!
  - C. So, like the leper, we come humbly to God for salvation because we know that we are unclean.
- II.Religion is not seeing our need for grace. We think we can save ourselves by being moral people.
  - A. It is not believing in the perfect holiness and justice of God.
    - 1. Isaiah had a vision of God (Isaiah 6:1-4).
      - (a) Seeing God's holiness, he saw himself clearly (Isaiah 6:5).
      - (b) "Woe to me..." God is so holy! I am so lost!
      - (c) Remember, this is Isaiah. Compared to people, he is holy.
      - (d) He also realizes how his community falls short.
    - 2. He receives grace (Isaiah 6:6-7).
    - 3. God says, "Whom shall I send?"
    - 4. Isaiah: "Send me."
      - (a) His response to grace is availability.
      - (b) "I will serve you God. You are worthy. I am honored."
      - (c) God wants availability to be our response also.
- III.Jesus told the leper how to appropriately respond.
  - A. "Don't tell anyone," is for the immediate context.

- 1. It isn't time for Jesus to be controversial yet.
- B. Two other responses are for us, though.
  - 1. Go show yourself to the priest.
  - 2. Offer the gift Moses commanded.
  - 3. Do these things as testimony to what God has done.
- C. The priests represent the religious establishment.
  - 1. They do the rituals prescribed by the Law.
    - (a) They still see works/morality as one's righteousness.
  - 2. Jesus is telling him to bear witness to the religious leaders.
    - (a) Tell them what God has done for him.
    - (b) Perhaps God will turn them from works to grace(Acts6:7)
  - 3. We have this same calling upon us.
    - (a) Many in our culture are religious.
    - (b) They may go to church. They may think they believe.
    - (c) But Jesus is not in their lives.
  - 4. God calls us to bear witness to the religious and irreligious.
    - (a) To intentionally develop relationships in our context.
    - (b) To tell the story of what God has done for us.
    - (c) To pray regularly for people.
    - (d) To pray for opportunity to share the Gospel.
  - 5. If you had the cure for leprosy, would you keep it a secret?
    - (a) The Gospel is the cure for something far more deadly.
- D. Offer the gift Moses commanded.
  - 1. Moses commanded that several animals be sacrificed.
    - (a) There was a guilt offering and a sin offering.
    - (b) The former leper would have to provide the animals.
  - 2. The sacrifices are made after the healing, not before it.
    - (a) They are not made to get clean.
    - (b) They are a response to having been made clean.
  - 3. God calls us to make a sacrifice also.
    - (a) Like the leper, we don't give anything to become clean.
    - (b) Salvation is a free gift that we receive by grace.
  - 4. We are called to respond to grace with a sacrifice (Rom12:1).
    - (a) We are the sacrifice! It's our life, lived for God(2Cor.5:15).
    - (b) We live for the one who cleansed us!
  - 5. Romans 12 also tells us how to offer our lives.
    - (a) Be transformed by the renewing of your mind.
    - (b) Fully embrace the values Jesus taught and be different.
    - (c) Use your spiritual gifts to serve both God and people.
    - (d) Sincerely love one another as you have been loved!
    - (e) Bless those who persecute you. Overcome evil with good!
  - 6. Why do we do this? What is our motivation?
    - (a) Do you think the leper was grateful to Jesus?
    - (b) Jesus gave himself so that we could be clean.
  - 7. Gratitude and love for Jesus, are why we want to live for Jesus! Jesus is worthy to be served!
